Field Landman Question of the Month

A DAPL member has asked:

“What is the significance of the federal court’s decision in *Highline v. QEP*?”

In the case of *Highline Exploration, Inc. et al. v. QEP Energy Company*,¹ the United States District Court for the District of North Dakota considered whether overriding royalty interests – which were said to be “free and clear” of costs and expenses associated with exploring, developing and operating – allowed for the deduction of costs and expenses associated with post-production activities. Although a decision from a federal court, the ruling in this case may provide North Dakota state courts with guidance on the difference between “production costs” and “post-production costs,” and the terminology typically used in connection with each.

In 2006, Highline Exploration, Inc., and the other plaintiffs (collectively, “Highline”) entered into an area of mutual interest agreement concerning the acquisition of oil and gas interests in McKenzie County, North Dakota. Highline took, and later sold, various prospect area leases, retaining an overriding royalty interest that burdened all said leasehold working interest, which was eventually acquired by QEP in 2012. The assignments creating Highline’s overriding royalty interests contained the following language:

Said Overriding Royalty Interest shall be free and clear of all costs and expenses whatsoever of exploring, developing, and operating said property, except ad valorem taxes, gross production taxes, severance taxes, and other taxes levied upon such overriding royalty or the production attributable thereto.

In 2018, Highline audited their accounts with QEP, which revealed that QEP had been deducting gathering, treating, compressing and transportation costs from Highline’s overriding royalty proceeds since QEP became operator of the prospect area. Highline then brought suit against QEP, alleging that QEP had wrongfully deducted approximately \$9 million in post-production costs from Highline’s overriding royalty proceeds since 2012.

In response, QEP did not deny that it had deducted post-production costs from Highline’s overriding royalty proceeds, but instead argued that these deductions were standard in the industry, and were not prohibited by the language of the various Highline overriding royalty assignments.

In considering the parties’ cross-motions for summary judgment, the court explained that, under applicable North Dakota law: (i) “the terms of the lease, nature of the costs and expenses to be deducted, and the type of royalty determines whether post-production costs are deductible from royalty”; (ii) the freedom of an overriding royalty from the “costs of production” was a “well-established oil and gas industry understanding”; and (iii) equally well-established was the concept that an overriding royalty “must pay a proportionate share of the post-production costs.”

The court also turned to the laws of other jurisdictions – a common undertaking for the federal courts sitting in diversity – to provide the distinction that “production costs” involve

“bringing oil or gas to the surface,” while “post-production costs” arise from “bringing the product to market,” such as “processing, compression, transportation, marketing, and other costs necessary to prepare raw oil or gas for sale.” Parties are free, the court noted, to adjust the language of their contract to account for these differing views of oil and gas development costs and expenses.

In considering the overriding royalty assignments at issue, the court stated that the only costs and expenses from which the interests are to be “free and clear” of are those for “exploration, development and operating.” The court then indicated, citing to various treatises and extra-jurisdictional cases, that such categories of costs are “well-understood in the oil and gas industry to be production costs, and none of them can be considered post-production costs.” Accordingly, the court concluded that “exploration, development and operating costs are production costs,” such that Highline and QEP “bargained for a traditional [overriding royalty interest], free of the costs of production, in which they share pro rata all post-production costs.”²

While not controlling precedent, the Highline decision does represent the first incidence of a court applying North Dakota law to an analysis focused on the terms of art generally used in the oil and gas industry with respect to production costs and post-production costs.
