From a Legal Perspective

No Trespassing: The 10th Circuit's Latest Ruling on the Accommodation Doctrine

The accommodation doctrine, which was first established by the Texas Supreme Court in *Getty Oil v. Jones*, protects the rights of both mineral owners and surface owners. Under the accommodation doctrine, an oil and gas lessee has an implied right to use as much of the land as is reasonably necessary to produce and remove minerals, but this implied right must be exercised with due regard for the surface owner's rights. *Getty Oil Co. v. Jones*, 470 S.W.2d 618, 621 (Tex. 1971). Over 20 years ago, the Colorado Supreme Court in *Gerrity Oil & Gas Corp. v. Magness* established what is now considered the Colorado common law on trespass through excessive surface use by an oil and gas operator. In *Gerrity*, the Colorado Supreme Court held that a mineral owner who exceeds what is reasonable and necessary to access relevant minerals has trespassed. *Gerrity Oil & Gas Corp. v. Magness*, 946 P.2d 913, 929 (Colo. 1997).

More recently, in December 2018, the United States Court of Appeals for the 10th Circuit in *Bay v. Anadarko E&P Onshore LLC* held that when a deed reservation reads “the right to use so much of said land as may be convenient or necessary,” such language does not expand mineral owner’s rights beyond those implied by common law. *Bay v. Anadarko E&P Onshore LLC*, 912 F.3d 1249, 1261 (10th Cir. 2018). Essentially, what is “convenient or necessary” is no different from what is “reasonable.” A mineral owner's rights may be expanded beyond common law but, under Colorado law, a deed must clearly define such an expansion of rights.

Bay v. Anadarko concerned a trespass claim by surface owners Marvin and Mildred Bay that Anadarko E&P Onshore LLC and Anadarko Land Corp., through their lessee, exceeded the scope of an easement by using excessive surface land to drill for oil and gas. The Bays were conveyed surface rights from Union Pacific Railroad Company in 1907 and their deed reserved to Union Pacific: (i) all coal and other minerals, (ii) the exclusive right to prospect for coal and other minerals, and (iii) the right of ingress, egress, and regress to prospect for, mine, and remove coal or other minerals, and “the right to use so much of said land as may be convenient or necessary for the right-of-way to and from such prospect places or mines, and for the convenient and proper operation of such prospect places, mines, and for roads and approaches thereto or for removal therefrom of coal, mineral, machinery or other material.” 912 F.3d at 1252. Anadarko later bought Union Pacific’s mineral rights and subsequently leased the rights beneath the Bays’ farm to United States Exploration. After three wells had been drilled on the Bays’ farm, Noble Energy bought United States Exploration and drilled four more wells. The Bays asked Noble Energy to drill directionally, rather than vertically, in order to reduce the number of well sites and reduce surface impact on the Bays’ land. Noble Energy requested \$100,000 per well to drill directionally and the Bays refused. Noble Energy proceeded to drill vertically and the Bays sued for trespass.

The United States District Court for the State of Colorado concluded that the phrase “convenient or necessary” granted Anadarko, or its lessee, the right to decide which method of drilling would be most suitable in the given situation, so long as the method was not commercially unreasonable or contrary to accepted industry practices. The district court determined that “convenient or necessary” should be viewed from the mineral owner’s perspective. The 10th Circuit disagreed for several reasons.

First, the 10th Circuit explained that under Colorado law, the goal of the court when interpreting a deed is to give effect to the instrument by ascertaining the parties’ intent at the time of execution. Absent ambiguity, the court should look at the four corners of the instrument and the deed’s words should be given their plain meaning. The 10th Circuit noted that the district court, while it didn’t explicitly reference any dictionary definition, likely used the modern definition of the term “convenient” in reaching the conclusion that Anadarko could choose the alternative that it deemed most suitable because Merriam-Webster’s Dictionary defines convenient as “suited to a particular situation.” The 10th Circuit, on the other hand, looked to definitions of “convenient” as used around the time the deed was executed. Black’s Law Dictionary in 1910 defined “convenient” similarly to the term “reasonable;” both terms were defined as “proper” and “just.” For the 10th Circuit, the “turn of the century” definition of “convenient” was more in line with the parties’ intent than the modern definition.

Second, the 10th Circuit pointed to the Colorado Supreme Court case *Barker v. Mintz*, 215 P. 534 (Colo. 1923) where the court interpreted a Union Pacific deed containing identical terms and found that “convenient or necessary” in a surface use reservation meant “reasonably necessary.” *Barker*, 215 P. at 536. The 10th Circuit explained that the holding in *Barker* suggests that the phrase “convenient or necessary” only permits uses of land that are necessary or reasonable, but “[a]t the very least, *Barker* does not support the district court’s interpretation that ‘convenient’ permits a mineral rights holder to choose freely, as a matter of law, between two surface uses even if one will have a greater impact on the surface than the other.”

The 10th Circuit then looked to the common law in other jurisdictions to “illustrate the tendency of courts to interpret the word ‘convenient’ to mean something similar to ‘reasonable’ in early twentieth-century deeds.” In one Colorado district court case where drilling vertically rather than directionally was deemed “necessary or convenient,” the agreement was from 1983, so the modern definition of “convenient” was relied on. *Zeiler Farms, Inc. v. Anadarko E&P Co.*, No. 07-CV-01985-WYD-MJW, 2010 WL 2681724 (D. Colo. July 1, 2010).

Finally, the 10th Circuit considered how the *Gerrity* court applied the accommodation doctrine, noting that the rule applies “[i]n the absence of statutes, regulations, or lease provisions to the contrary.” Thus, according to the 10th Circuit, a deed reservation must clearly define an expanded ownership right. Although the

list of exclusions in *Gerrity* does not include deeds, the 10th Circuit explained that “creating a severed mineral estate requires a deed to accomplish severance.” Further, *Gerrity* cited two Colorado cases in which the court looked to the language of deeds and concluded the deeds’ language did not require the court to deviate from the common law approach. Thus, although the 10th Circuit did not decide how clear or explicit a deed must be to expand a surface or mineral right, the court concluded that the deed reservation at issue was insufficient.

This case reminds landmen and mineral title examiners that the time in which a deed was executed can change the meaning of the words within. Since courts will try to determine the parties’ intent at the time a deed was executed, a reservation from the early 19th century can have a different meaning from a reservation made in the 1980’s. In Colorado, the accommodation doctrine remains the standard unless a deed clearly defines an expansion of rights.
