From a Legal Perspective

U.S. District Court for Louisiana Enjoins Section 5 of Biden's Executive Order 13990 Nationwide

State of Louisiana v. Biden, Case No. 2:21-CV-01074 in the United States District Court for the Western District of Louisiana, was filed on April 22, 2021 by ten States seeking to enjoin the social cost of carbon greenhouse gas ("SC-GHG") methodologies and applications of the Interagency Working Group ("IWG") mandated in Section 5 of Executive Order 13990, "Accounting for the Benefits of Reducing Climate Pollution," issued by President Biden on January 20, 2021. EO 13990 established the IWG, which was charged with publishing estimates of the monetized damages associated with incremental increases in greenhouse gas emissions, or "social costs", including an accounting for global damages.

The ten Plaintiff States include Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, South Dakota, Texas, West Virginia and Wyoming, which sought injunctive and declaratory relief from the mandates of EO 13990, arguing (1) the order violated the Administrative Procedure Act ("APA") for failure to provide proper notice and rulemaking procedures; (2) the President lacked authority to enforce the SC-GHG; and (3) the administration's actions exceeded congressional authority, in part, by improperly basing regulatory policy upon global considerations. The States pointed out the SC-GHG estimates mandated under EO 13990 "are the most expansive, and potentially most expensive, federal regulatory initiative in history" and have never been subject to a proper notice-and-comment process from their origins in the Obama Administration. In short, according to the States, "Section 5 of EO 13990 will remake our federalism balance of power, American life, and the American economy by directing all federal agencies to employ in all their 'decision-making,' including rulemaking, a numeric value for the costs of greenhouse gas emissions that will ensure the most pervasive regulation in American history."

The Plaintiff States requested the court (1) prohibit Defendants from employing the SC-GHG in any manner; (2) enjoin Defendants from relying on the SC-GHG methodology considering global effects, discount rates, and time horizons; and (3) order Defendants to return to OMB Circular A-4 for regulatory analysis. Circular A-4 was issued on September 17, 2003 by the George W. Bush Administration and provides guidance for regulatory agencies to measure and report "economically significant regulatory actions" according to three basic criteria: (1) the need for the proposed action, (2) an examination of alternative approaches, and (3) an evaluation of the benefits and costs—quantitative and qualitative—of the proposed action and the main alternatives identified by the analysis.

On February 11, 2022, U.S. District Court Judge James D. Cain, Jr. granted in its entirety the Plaintiffs' motion for a preliminary injunction against the Biden Administration. The Court's order enjoined and restrained all Federal agencies from relying upon or implementing Section 5 of Executive Order 13990 in any manner and ordering the Defendants to return to the guidance of Circular A-4 in conducting regulatory analysis.

The Court addressed (1) whether the Plaintiff States satisfied the doctrine of standing; (2) whether the Plaintiff States asserted claims subject to judicial review under the APA; and (3) whether the Plaintiff States satisfied the requirements to obtain a preliminary injunction. The Court emphasized it was "not opining as to the scientific issues regarding greenhouse gas emissions, their effects on the environment, or whether they contribute to global warming."

As to the issue of standing, the Court was "persuaded that the Biden Administration's agencies are using the SC-GHG . . . [and] that the Plaintiff States have established injury-in-fact." Further, the application of SC-GHG estimates is increasing regulatory costs, and the Plaintiff States met their burden of alleging that their injury is "fairly traceable" to the challenged act. The Court also agreed that the remedy sought by the Plaintiff States will redress their injury, and that to the extent any State among the Plaintiff group would not have standing under a traditional analysis, those states have standing under "special solitude." Such standing may be found where States believe they control matters over which the federal government asserts authority.

As to the issue of whether the Plaintiff States asserted claims subject to judicial review under the APA; the Court found the IWG's SC-GHG estimates constitute a final agency action under the APA; that the Plaintiff States seek to protect interests which undoubtedly fall within the zone of interests embodied by the APA and other statutes claimed to be violated by Defendants; and that the Court's judicial review of the Plaintiffs' claims was not excluded from judicial review under the APA.

Finally, the Court found the Plaintiff States had satisfied all requirements to obtain a preliminary injunction, including "(1) a substantial likelihood of success on the merits; (2) a substantial threat of irreparable injury if the injunction is

not issued; (3) that the threatened injury if the injunction is denied outweighs any harm that will result if the injunction is granted; and (4) that the grant of an injunction will not disserve the public interest.” See *Sepulvado v. Jindal*, 729 F.3d 413, 417 (5th Cir. 2013).

The Court’s order granting the preliminary injunction became effective immediately and will remain in effect pending final resolution of the case or until further order from the District Court, Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals or United States Supreme Court. On February 19, the Department of Justice filed a Declaration with the Louisiana District Court in support of the Biden Administration’s motion to stay the preliminary injunction pending Defendants’ appeal to the Fifth Circuit. The Declaration, given by Dominic J. Mancini, Deputy Administrator of the Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs (“OIRA”), claims the preliminary junction will have negative impacts on agency rulemakings and actions, will disrupt coordination between agencies and the executive branch, and will undermine current efforts to calculate SC-GHG, among other adverse effects.

Field Landman Question of the Month

Status of the ‘Commercial Discovery Rule’ in Colorado

A DAPL Member has asked: Has there been an appeal from the Colorado Court of Appeals decision rendered in the Board of County Commissioners of Boulder County v. Crestone Peak Resources Operating LLC (2021 WL 1916380, 2021 COA 67 (Colo. Ct. 2021)) litigation involving lease perpetuation? The short answer is yes: on January 10, 2022, the Colorado Supreme Court announced that it would hear a challenge to the appellate court’s application of the ‘commercial discovery rule’ to oil and gas leases.

As discussed in a previous Field Landman Question of the Month, the above referenced case presented the Colorado Court of Appeals (Division I) with the question of whether lease habendum clauses calling for ‘production’ required the actual, continuous extraction of oil and gas to maintain a lease beyond its primary term. The Crestone Peak court held that ‘production’ was satisfied by discovery in commercial quantities, and that actual extraction of oil and gas was not required.

Following this ruling, the Board of County Commissioners of Boulder County (“Boulder County”) filed a Petition for Writ of Certiorari (“Petition”) with the Colorado Supreme Court on June 24, 2021, asking that it overturn the appellate court’s decision. Boulder County classified the ‘commercial discovery rule’ as “a minority, disfavored approach to lease interpretation,” proposing the “well-reasoned, majority rule” of ‘actual production’ should instead be applied. It also claimed that the ‘commercial discovery rule’ contravened lease and contract interpretation rules (e.g., applying the plain meaning of terms, giving effect to the parties’ intentions, and construing leases in favor of lessors). Lastly, Boulder County contended that the ‘commercial discovery rule’ was inconsistent with prior Colorado precedent which held that marketing is an aspect of production, stating that this conclusion leads directly to the actual production rule.

Crestone Peak Resources Operating LLC (“Crestone Peak,” which is now part of Civitas Resources Inc.) responded with an Opposition to Petition for Writ of Certiorari, filed on July 29, 2021, asserting that the appellate court correctly applied “long-standing” Colorado law and “well settled principles of contract construction.” It argued that Boulder County’s characterization of the Crestone Peak court’s decision as the ‘minority rule’ was incorrect, and, even if true, was not a reason to grant the Petition. It also maintained that “the commercial discovery rule is good policy,” because as explained by the Crestone Peak court, it protects lessees from losing large financial investments if actual production temporarily pauses, while the implied duty to market protects lessors from operators holding leases indefinitely without making a diligent effort to develop and market the oil and gas. Additionally, Crestone Peak noted that Boulder County waived its argument regarding marketing being an aspect of production before the court of appeals, and therefore, such argument may not now be raised. Regardless, however, Crestone Peak claimed that the precedent to which Boulder County referred had no bearing on the current inquiry as it did not concern the term ‘production’ in a lease habendum clause, but rather the allocation costs associated with producing and processing oil and gas among lessees and lessors.

Boulder County then filed a Reply in Support of Petition for Writ of Certiorari on August 5, 2021, reiterating its arguments that contracts must be construed according to their plain language, and that the actual production rule is favored by other jurisdictions. It also claimed that while its briefs to the court of appeals did not address the allocation of cost precedent, the same was raised in oral argument, such that “[t]he relationship of marketing and production is an issue squarely before this Court.” Finally, Boulder County asserted that the “well-established” precedent Crestone Peak identified as establishing the ‘commercial discovery rule’ in Colorado has never been cited by another Colorado court for that purpose.

By Order of Court entered January 10, 2022, the Colorado Supreme Court, sitting En Banc, granted Boulder County’s Petition, reframing the issue it would consider as follows: “Whether the court of appeals erred in adopting and applying the ‘commercial discovery rule’ in interpreting oil and gas leases.” Petitioner’s Opening Brief was originally due by February 21, 2022, with Respondent’s Answer Brief to be filed within 35 days of receipt of the Opening Brief, and Petitioner’s Reply Brief due within 21 days from receipt of the Answer Brief. However, on February 15, 2022, the Court granted Boulder County’s request for an extension of time to file its opening and amicus briefs, the same now being due on March 14, 2022. As of the writing of this article, no briefs had been filed.

Discussion regarding having new sponsors fund specific functions, i.e. luncheons or happy hours or create new sponsorship opportunities. Will table to another time to review and discuss.

Gil has planned a Corporate Sponsor appreciation wine event January 20.

Land Leadership. Reported by Jake.

Updating company leadership database. Jake set up meeting next week with Lathrop regarding sponsorship. Thomas spoke with Oxy regarding optimizing virtual meetings and thought virtual networking opportunities would be valuable. Jake will need help on companies for which we need company contacts. Jake will reach out to board members.

IT:

Brett Wisner stepping away from duties as IT Chairman. Tyler Aylor nominated by Thomas to become new IT Committee Chairman, second by Kelly. APPROVED. Tyler will help identify deficiencies in systems and make recommendations, etc. Tag Team designs began working for DAPL in 2015, average monthly cost has been \$313.40 for website and IT. Monthly cost (not including buildout) over past two months as been \$202.94. Costs for Third Party services has been \$85.73 and cost for Demio has been \$163.75 per month. Current website has shelf-life of 5-7 years, we're currently in year 6. Tyler has started to explore association management companies and recommends StarChapter. Costs going forward would be approx. \$150.13/month (below 600 members) or \$185.25 (up to 1,200 members) as opposed to \$313.40 currently. DAPL currently has 500 active members, but over 1,200 in database. Tyler will check into next pricing tier over 1,200 members. StarChapter currently handles Dallas and Permian Basin APL websites. Their dashboard and Knowledgebase database would be very helpful and are easy to use, and they can also handle email distribution groups, surveys, team meetings, etc. rather than third parties to which we currently pay extra. Estimate 8-10 weeks to build out, would want to have functional in time for April membership renewal season. Thomas moved DAPL make final payment \$1300 to Kyle, second by Kelly. APPROVED. Thomas motioned to move IT from Tag Team to StarChapter, second by Anna. APPROVED.

Ski day. Reported by Ed.

Secured group rate of \$81/person at Winter Park. Onsite - Derailler Bar for Après Ski, open beer/wine bar for \$80/person = \$161/person total. Working with WSU for student participation. Courtney working on tickets and securing transportation. Will have flyers at January luncheon.

Education Committee. Reported by Bresee.

Speakers lined up through March. Costs have increased for monthly luncheon contracts. Break-even is \$44/person. Will need to raise costs for luncheon or get sponsors to stay in black. Corporate sponsors also receive free luncheons, so will be difficult to break even without considering sponsorship funds. Bresee mentioned contacting Crusoe or another company to sponsor presentation database. January registration is already open. Will table luncheon price increase discussion for now, but Thomas asked for recommendation from committee regarding virtual platform and costs going forward.

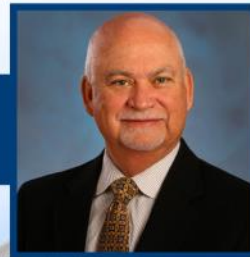
